The Greenville Kennel Club Celebrates 80 Years



ime flies when we're having fun! According to South Carolina's Greenville Kennel Club President Jeanette Stribling, "The year 2019 will be the club's time to embrace its glorious 80 year past while focusing on the future."

AKC member clubs do many things to reflect great credit to our organization's mission statement. The Greenville Kennel Club is a shining example of our sport's commitment and spirit.

In 1939, the club's Certificate of Incorporation stated the purpose of the Greenville Kennel Club was to: Promote the breeding of, protect and advance the interest of pure bred dogs, encourage and hold dog shows, exhibitions, matches and field trials, prevent cruelty to animals, without gain or renumeration to the members or stockholders. The original officers of the club were:

Whenever we hear old timers in the sport wishing for the old days, perhaps looking back on the Greenville Kennel Club's history will reveal why. Our first show took place on Monday, April 1 and Tuesday, April 2, 1949, at the city's Textile Hall. It was a Benched Show with the Entertainment Committee kicking off the festivities at 11:00 am on Monday. There were 404 entries from 30 states, DC and Ontario and Quebec, Canada. The Show Catalog cost .25.

Monday judging commenced at 2:00 pm followed by formal evening competition commencing at 8:00 pm followed by an open bar compliments of the club.


Tuesday morning fanciers gathered for a Dog Show Breakfast at the Greenville Hotel. All exhibitors and professional handlers were invited as guests of the Greenville Kennel Club. Again breed judging kicked off at 2:00 pm, followed by brace judging at 8:00 pm with formal Groups and Best iIn Show beginning at 9:00 pm.

How would today's exhibitors react to this note from Superintendent Edgar A. Moss (the M of MBF today). Note: The order of judging will be as near the assigned time as possible. The Bench Show Committee will change this arrangement if circumstances make it necessary.

Yes, the good old days were filled social graces and friendships cemented through people from all across the country coming together bonded by their love of dogs to enjoy true Southern Hospitality! It would be nice to turn back the clock! By the time the 50th Anniversary Show rolled around on July 29, 1989, 124 Breeds made up 2407 entries. In addition there were 163 dogs in Obedience.

Today cultivating a new generation of enthusiasts for our AKC sports is first on the agenda for the Greenville club.





With a membership of 100 which includes leaders with many decades of knowledge the club is attracting newcomers with strong talents to educate for the future. And in doing so members are creating magical moments and memories.

Much of GKC's support goes to the Greenville County Sheriff's Department which is one of the most advanced K9 Units in the Southeast. The unit has it's own certified master trainer and uses multiple types of dogs for all purpose, detection and search and rescue. Some of the Greenville Kennel Club's recent contributions include thousands of dollars to cover expenses for a Tactical Deployment Workshops for two years. Last year's workshop was attended by 80 officers from 8 states representing 30 law enforcement agencies. Club member Blake Roulette assisted by Robert L. Vandiver is our club Law Enforcement Liaison. The pair worked to see that these events were successful. In addition to the trainers from the Greenville County Sheriff's Office, 4 Master Trainers and 6 Trainers from the North American Police Work Dog Association (NAPWDA) were in attendance providing instruction to the participants over a four day period.

For the Sheriff's Department GKC recently purchased 2 new dogs for their K9 Unit totaling \$8,000.00 each. The club sponsored and covered all costs for a Training Workshop having several certified Master Trainers presenting an all day lecture on training and testing followed by 2 full days of field work with handlers working with their canine partners.

GKC paid expenses for two months training for a Sheriff's Department officer to become a certified Master Trainer. The club also presents two beautiful engraved plaques for each retiring K9, one which is displayed in the Sheriff's Department offices and one for the retiring canine's human officer. As needed GKC purchases equipment for the K9 Unit's training grounds. When the Sheriff's Department purchased a new wrapped K9 Unit Trailer, they included the Greenville Kennel Club logo, which is the only non-police decal on the vehicle.

Members of GKC realize what a difference its Sheriff's Department K9 Unit makes for the lives of the community and they have worked hard to be able to support and build friendships with the team. When the AKC Disaster Relief Trailer program began, the Greenville Kennel Club enthusiastically donated \$10,000.00 to help sponsor a trailer. Pledging funds for AKC Museum of the Dog and the AKC PAC are more of the numerous recent contributions. The Greenville Take the Lead party was so much fun! Recently awarded the AKC Sportsmanship award, Show Chairman Kris Harner oversees the Carolina Foothills Cluster shows. The Greenville Kennel Club and the Piedmont Kennel Club join forces for four days of All-Breed shows including Rally and Obedience at the Greenville Convention Center.

Everyone remembers the late beloved judge Bill Dwelly. His daughter, Sue Dwelly coordinates the many Specialty Shows also surrounding the Shows. Greenville is the place to come get your majors and new titles. Mark your calendar to enter this July 25–28!
