Shortly after their move to Cashiers, Jim and I were their first guests in their new home named *Silver Lining*. Hurricane Opal had





"While the Westminister show has been a part of my life for over thirty years, the last decade has been even more intense. I use 'intense' because of the variety of activities and length of time spent in New York City. We'd start on the Thursday before and end with the Dog Fanciers Luncheon Club meeting on Wednesday...now that's a week!

"Gaines and/or Ken-L Ration has always had a big booth at the garden. For those who have never had to deal with getting materials in, paying the exorbitant fees, hiring guards to watch over Garden Security, dealing with the mob scene, live SHOWSIGHT MAGAZINE / JANUARY 1996

"Then in 1980, Tom O'Shea proposed we host a hospitality room for the press. It became the Gaines/Cycle Hospitality Room. We could use the forum to introduce some major improvements to our product Gravy Train. This started in the Hilton (Then Penta, then Ramada, etc.) They weren't too thrilled with our sneaking in our own food and refreshments. As the invitation list spread to judges, our Professional Feeder Plan members, etc., and the menu dramatically became more exotic, Tom found us a new home...the Southgate Towers. Here we were, and are, encouraged to bring in Edie O'Shea's wonderful home cooked food. Last year we had three kitchens working full time!

"As an aside, the Hospitality Room



Barbara, with Jim Knorr...the friendship started with a golf cart, now rates a buss became so popular, we were allowed to present it for five days in Philadelphia during the AKC's 100th. (What a week that was.)

"So, for fifteen years Gaines, then Ken-L Ration, and now Heinz, have been feeding and refreshing Dog Writers Association of America members, judges, breeders, and



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stewards. We've been open from 7:00 am until 2:00 am on Monday and Tuesday. Tom's Belgian Waffles on Tuesday morning are a ritual. Edie always outdoes herself as to variety, flavor and quantity of food. Volunteer bartenders have always been welcome and often provide comic relief. The Dog Writers Association of America holds their annual meeting there. One of my prized possessions is one of their outstanding service awards presented to me in 1993 by then-president Hal Sundstrom.

"Many, many long-lasting friendships have been started in the hospitality room. For lots of folks, that's the only time they get to see each other. People come from across the nation for fellowship, food and fun. For the past several years Katie O'Shea has been on hand to provide support for her mom and dad. She's even going to college studying to work in the hospitality industry. My wife, Barbara, and I have spend many hours helping out with food prep and cleanup...but not this year, 1996, now that we've taken early retirement. We'll miss our friends, but not the long hours. I don't know how Edie and Tom do it. If any of you go this year, go overboard on your thanks to them and then especially to Mike Retzlaff from Heinz for paying for it.

"Over the years we've learned some lessons: don't let people get so soused that they try to stay overnight in the hospitality room; take help on the trips to Macy's Bakery; get the Southgate to slice the meats so we don't slice ourselves; lock your van when unloading [Tom had all of his clothes stolen while checking in]; publish hours, manage people's expectations about what and when we're serving, recruit helpers. Most people are really nice and appreciative...but not everyone is as courteous as they should be: don't let the little things bother you and most of all have a great time yourself!

"As many of you know twenty-four of my thirty-two years in the game were with Gaines, the last eight years with Gaines/Ken-L Ration so the Quaker/Bisket/Ken-L-Ration dinner was, until 1987, something about which I had only heard glow-

ing reports. In the 90's responsibility for planning and executing the dinner was my department. Fortunately, I had a great staff and we had some terrific events. "For those of you fortunate enough to have attended in the past, you know this is like the Oscars.....a fashion show, men in black tie, celebrity guests, acceptance speeches from proud owners and from proud and often humble handlers. There is so much history in forty years that it can not be recapped here in one brief interview.

"A commemorative program was prepared for the fortieth celebration; I believe there may be a few extras available. Contact Patie Ventre, 4547 Bedford Avenue, Brooklyn, New York 11235. Patie did the superb job of planning and executing last year's event.

"There are many stories and reactions to the celebrity guests and their comments. Remember, you can't please everyone every year. Some were great, some were flops, some were at their peak, some were oldtimers. Some were into dogs, some were into sports. Last year's feature guest was one of your own......Bill Trainor. I, for one thought he was perfect for helping to celebrate the fortieth. Bill's returning this year.

"For me, one of the highlights each year is the warm recognition given Russ Webb who worked nearly forty years for Ken-L Ration and is still such a friend to so many on the dog fancy.
