



To update this conversation, Corky just judged the first point show for the Ochlockonee River Kennel Club of Florida. The herding group was on her schedule and again a very steady, confident and self-assured German Shepherd bitch was in the ring. Corky awarded the Group One placement to the Shepherd. Her handler Jimmy Moses told Corky after the show that this win was the ninety-ninth Group One for "Mystique". It is the ultimate accolade for a judge to find a dog and then see it soar!
